

RESOLUTION NO. 2095-2021

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, TO ADOPT A NEW CITY STRATEGIC PLAN FOR FISCAL YEARS 2022 THROUGH 2025; PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION OF RECITALS, REPEAL OF PRIOR INCONSISTENT RESOLUTIONS AND COUNCIL DECISIONS, ADMINISTRATIVE ASSIGNMENT AND AUTHORIZATION, SEVERABILITY, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on May 14, 2021, the City Council and the City's Executive Leadership Team (ELT) participated in a City a Strategic Planning Workshop facilitated by the Florida Institute of Government to enable the City Council to formalize strategic priorities, goals, and objectives to support the overall direction of the community; and

WHEREAS, the direction was based on the results of multiple Community Conversations held with the citizens of the City of Jacksonville Beach and a previous workshop where the City Council and the City's ELT created Mission and Vision Statements (both which were adopted by the City Council via separate resolutions on March 15, 2021) to guide the development of a Strategic Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Strategic Plan contains the priorities, goals, and objectives needed to achieve the vision for the community; and

WHEREAS, the May 14, 2021 Strategic Planning Workshop resulted in the identification of three overarching priorities, with two goals for each priority, and two objectives for each goal; and

WHEREAS, as with the establishment of the Vision and Mission Statements, staff reviewed the draft document and provided recommendations for the City Council's consideration at a briefing on June 28, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the June 28, 2021 briefing resulted in language changes to some of the original priorities, goals, and objectives, and the addition of a fourth priority, Sustainability, with three goals to address the perspectives of finance, environment, and organization; and

WHEREAS, upon adoption of this Resolution, City staff will develop a plan on an annual basis that operationalizes the Strategic Plan, which will be shared with the City Council upon its completion; and

WHEREAS, it is intended that the Strategic Plan be reviewed and re-adopted once every four years, to coincide with the seating of a new Council. It is also intended that annual progress reports be provided to Council to chart progress against the Strategic Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, THAT:

SECTION 1. Adoption of Recitals. The foregoing recitals are deemed true and material parts of this resolution and are fully incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 2. Adoption of new City Strategic Plan for Fiscal Years 2022 through 2025. The City Council hereby adopts the new City Strategic Plan for Fiscal Years 2022 through 2025 which is attached hereto as Attachment A and incorporated fully herein for all purposes.

SECTION 3. Repeal of Prior Inconsistent Resolutions and Council Decisions. All prior resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

SECTION 4. Administration Assignment and Authorization. The City Council hereby authorizes and directs the City Manager to commence any steps necessary to implement, utilize, and promote the new City Strategic Plan for FY2022-2025. The City Manager is authorized to delegate any tasks and activities to staff as the City Manager deems appropriate.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this resolution should be held invalid, unlawful, or unconstitutional, said determination shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force, or effect of any other section, sentence, phrase, or portion of this resolution not otherwise determined to be invalid, unlawful, or unconstitutional.

SECTION 6. Effective Date. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage and adoption by City Council.

BACKGROUND

The Urban Trails Project is an ambitious concept to connect our neighborhoods to a high-quality, shared-use path network that provides a safe, intuitive, and comfortable way to walk, run, bike, or skate to the beach, parks, schools, shops, jobs, and other destinations.

The City issued RFQ Number 01-2021 seeking consulting services to develop an Urban Trails Master Plan. The City desires the Consultant to:

- (a) Identify and provide recommendations for a comprehensive bicycle and pedestrian trail network that improves connectivity and mobility;
- (b) Provide direction, prioritization, and cost estimation for implementation and construction, including future improvements; and
- (c) Assist the City with grant opportunities and help position it to be more competitive when seeking funding.

The City received a total of four responses to RFQ Number 01-2021. An evaluation committee consisting of the Director of Public Works, Director of Planning and Development, Golf Course Superintendent, Parks and Recreation Office Administrator, and Director of Parks and Recreation evaluated each response based on the following criteria:

City Manager

Remote Participation

City Manager Mike Staffopoulos stated the City currently has no policies regarding a Council member's virtual attendance at a regular Council meeting. Mr. Staffopoulos explained the City Attorney opined virtual attendance at a regular Council meeting as allowable, provided specific criteria are met.

The Council was provided with three documents [on file] for reference: City of Neptune Beach Resolution Regarding Remote Attendance at Meetings; State of Virginia Remote Participation Statute; and City of Jacksonville Beach Draft Resolution Regarding Remote Participation (drafted by City Attorney). City Attorney Sandy Robinson reviewed the documents with the Council.

A conversation ensued regarding different criteria and options in the draft Resolution regarding remote participation. The Council's consensus was to revise the draft resolution, including the discussed changes, and bring the draft resolution to a Council Briefing for further review.

Park Signs and Rebranding

She suggested only Pension Board applicants should be interviewed next week, and any other applicants for other Boards could be interviewed at a later date. It was the consensus of the Council to keep the upcoming Pension interviews separate from other board interviews.

BACKGROUND

Based on extensive research and widespread community outreach, CHW Professional Consultants has developed a conceptual network of urban trails within the City. The goal is to provide pedestrians and cyclists (and everything in between) the ability to travel safely between parks, neighborhoods, schools, commercial areas, and the beach. A secondary goal was to support a network that could be reached within an 8-minute walk from anywhere in the City. The conceptual network trail is comprised of primary and secondary corridors that afford such connectivity.

The primary corridors can be viewed as a loop that would allow residents and visitors the ability to travel the City:

North or South along:

- 1st Steet on the east, and
- Penman Road and 10 Street South, on the west.

East or West along:

- 15th Avenue North on the north, and
- 12th Avenue South on the south.

Secondary corridors will provide further connectivity to the primary corridors from neighborhoods, commercial areas, schools, and parks throughout the City.

1st Street has long been an established, popular bicycle and pedestrian path and the proximity to the beach makes it a natural, key component of the primary network. This route is bounded by Seagate Avenue to the north and Ponte Vedra Boulevard to the south. It can be viewed in three segments:

- 1. <u>North:</u> from Seagate Avenue to 6th Avenue North. It serves both single family and multifamily residential development. The roadway is generally a two-lane undivided roadway with bike lanes and sidewalks.
- 2. **Commercial:** from 6th Avenue North to Beach Boulevard.



3. <u>South</u>: from Beach Boulevard to Ponte Vedra Boulevard. This segment is also residential. Where the North segment is more multi-family, the South segment is more single family. This part of the corridor consists of two travel lanes with bike lanes, but the sidewalk only exists in a portion of the corridor.

The southernmost portion of the 1st Street corridor, south of 25th Avenue South, is a one-way street northbound. The one-way segment has one 14-foot wide travel lane for vehicles, a single bike lane, and on-street parking within 30 feet of pavement.

The entire 1st Street segment has been identified by the East Coast Greenway as the preferred routing for their Maine to Key West connection goal. (The East Coast Greenway requires a defined barrier separating vehicular and bicycle/pedestrian traffic).

Analysis


The design of the corridor should be uniform and consistent from north to south. Ideally, a 10-foot multi-use trail would allow safe pedestrian and bicycle traffic in both directions. The key to a safe and comfortable multi-use trail is the buffer between the trail and vehicular traffic. Due to the location of the trail along the coast and through the downtown/commercial area, use could be significant if designed correctly to provide a safe and comfortable experience.

Generally, 1st Street consists of 30 feet of pavement. Following are some options for the residential sections of 1st Street:

Option 1:

Using the existing 30 feet of pavement, convert to a one-way vehicular traffic lane of 12 feet. Create a raised traffic buffer of 8 feet between vehicular traffic and a 10-foot multi-use path. The wider buffer width would allow planting, if desired. (Minimizing the width of the travel lane to 10 feet would allow for a wider buffer or multi-use path).

OPTION 1





Option 2:

By extending the pavement width into one of the grass utility strips between the curb and sidewalk, 34 feet of pavement is created. Two-way vehicular traffic lanes can be maintained with a width of 11 feet each. This would allow for a raised traffic buffer of 4 feet between vehicular traffic and the multi-use path. The multi-use path would be 10 feet wide. The 2-foot buffer area may allow limited ground level planting, but is typically paved.




Option 3:

By extending the pavement width into one of the grass utility strips and sidewalk area, 39 feet of pavement is created. Two-way vehicular traffic lanes can be maintained with a width of 10 feet each. This would allow for a raised traffic buffer of 7 feet between vehicular traffic and the multi-use path could be 12 feet wide. While the sidewalk would be eliminated on one side of the road, the wider multi-use path would accommodate pedestrian activities as well as the other uses. The wider buffer width would allow planting, if desired.



OPTION 3



The commercial portion of 1st Street presents a different opportunity. The cross section currently has flush pavement with a two-way travel lane. There are many examples of similar commercial streets that are completely closed to traffic or have limited access at certain times to allow for deliveries.

Implementing one-way traffic through the commercial area would allow pedestrian activities to expand through the use of street furniture and planters and by providing ample room for a multi-use trail corridor.

This concept is typically referred to as a commercial shared street. This shared street type is considered when pedestrian volumes are high (or have the potential to be high) and traffic volumes are low or are desired to remain low.

A commercial shared street allows vehicles. This shared implementation is done to accommodate the heaviest pedestrian use times by prioritizing and enhancing the pedestrian experience over accommodating a vehicle. During periods of lower pedestrian activity, vehicular traffic can be allowed to facilitate easy access to businesses for customers and deliveries.

Even if vehicular access is always permitted, it is permitted at low speeds. The low vehicular speeds are accomplished through regulation, environmental cues to drivers, and the prominence and possibility of pedestrian activity.

As a shared street, pedestrian activity is considered the priority. For decades, typical sidewalks have been constructed at a width of five feet. Two people, side-by-side, can easily fit on a 5-foot- wide sidewalk and, with minimal use, sidewalk capacity is not an issue. However, adding pedestrians in opposing directions requires groups of walkers to walk single file.



This congestion or crowding may force people into planter areas or into the street. Both can be safety hazards due to the trip hazards (planters and curbs) or vehicle interactions. Moving street furniture into the right of way and further delineating a travel lane would allow vehicular use when necessary or desired.

Consultant's Recommendation

In the residential segments of 1st Street north and south of downtown, implement one-way travel lanes for vehicles with a multi-use trail corridor and a barrier/buffer between the trail and vehicle travel lane. (Option 1).

In the downtown/commercial area, close the roadway from 6th Avenue North to just north of Beach Boulevard. Encourage pedestrian use as the primary activity with local delivery and maintenance access at certain times.

The conceptual trail includes portions of undeveloped ROW that is adjacent to residential property, such as 8th Street North and McClure Lane from Fairway Lane to the landfill near Sanctuary Boulevard. Some residents may not embrace the value of a trail in the ROW adjacent to their backyard. However, our experience over several similar projects is that most residents ultimately embrace the trail once completed and recognize the potential value it could have on their property.

Streets Superintendent Dave McDonald provided the Council with an outline of two options of possible solid waste and recycling collection/disposal [on file].

A conversation ensued regarding the surrounding beach communities' waste and recycling collection schedules and fees. It was the consensus of the Council for Mr. McDonald to obtain quotes for solid waste and recycling collection and present it to the Council for review at a future briefing.

ARPA Update

Chief Financial Officer Ashlie Gossett provided an update regarding the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding. Ms. Gossett stated the deadline for obligating federal received monies is December 31, 2024, with expenditure by the end of FY2026. However, the City of Jacksonville (COJ) funds require full expenditure by September 30, 2022.

Ms. Gossett stated several projects were approved by the Council in a briefing on November 22, 2021, and met eligible requirements while conforming to expenditure deadlines at the federal and COJ levels. These projects were divided into two categories: Priorities 1 and 2.

Ms. Gossett explained since the November 22, 2021 briefing, there had been a significant escalation in cost. As a result, the updated estimates for Priority 1 projects now exceed the direct ARPA funding, as shown in the attached table.

Ms. Gossett stated staff met with the grant administrator of COJ and was advised investments in information technology, public safety, and public buildings were permissible, in addition to previously identified water/sewer projects.

WHEREAS, in October 2021, the City Council approved a contract with CHW to provide professional planning and design services to produce an Urban Trails Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, at the City Council Briefing on July 25, 2022, the City Council reviewed a draft of the Master Plan and requested certain changes to be made to it by CHW; and

WHEREAS, CHW has made all changes requested by the City Council to the Urban Trails Master Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, THAT:

SECTION 1. Adoption of the Urban Trials Master Plan. The City Council hereby authorizes and directs the City Manager to commence all steps necessary to implement, administer, and promote the Urban Trails Master Plan, and to delegate any tasks and activities relative thereto and in furtherance thereof to staff, as the City Manager deems appropriate in his sole discretion.

SECTION 3. Repeal of Prior Inconsistent Resolutions and Council Decisions. All prior resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

SECTION 4. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this resolution should be held invalid, unlawful, or unconstitutional, said determination shall not be held to

invalidate or impair the validity, force, or effect of any other section, sentence, phrase, or portion of this resolution not otherwise determined to be invalid, unlawful, or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage and adoption by City Council.

Item B Adopt/Deny Ordinance No. 2022-8187 on the second reading for a Text Amendment to the Land Development Code for Fence Height

Mayor Hoffman requested the City Clerk read Ordinance No. 2022-8187 by title only, whereupon Ms. Gosselin read the following:

"AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, AMEND AN ORDINANCE **ENACTING** FLORIDA. TO COMPREHENSIVE LAND **DEVELOPMENT ESTABLISHING** Α OFFICIAL **ZONING** MAP FOR REGULATION AND INCORPORATED AREA OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, AS AUTHORIZED BY CHAPTER 163.3202, FLORIDA **AMENDING** ARTICLE VIII, DIVISION BY STATUTES, SUPPLEMENTAL STANDARDS, TO MODIFY THE FENCE HEIGHT REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

Mayor Hoffman read the following: "This ordinance for the amendment of the Land Development Code is before this Council for a public hearing and consideration on its second reading. Under the laws of the State of Florida, an ordinance which changes the actual list of permitted, conditional, or prohibited uses within a zoning category or which otherwise changes the text of the Land Development Code, is a 'quasi-legislative' proceeding. A quasi-legislative proceeding means that a governing body is acting in its rule-making capacity.

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It is the duty of the Council to arrive at sound decisions regarding the use of property within the City. This includes receiving citizen input regarding the proposed uses within a zoning category.

The application has been reviewed by Staff and the Planning Commission for consistency with other portions of the Land Development Code and the Comprehensive Plan. The Council may hear from all interested parties in the legislative determination of an amendment to the text of the Land Development Code.

The Council's decision on a text amendment application is based on the criteria set forth in Section 34-211 of the Land Development Code. Each member of the Council has been provided a copy of the criteria.

I will now open the public hearing on Ordinance No. 2022-8187."

CHAPTER 4

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Public engagement for this planning process began in the Fall of 2021 and continued throughout the approval process and plan completion. Early on, City of Jacksonville Beach staff determined the overall engagement goal for this project to be collaborative with the public through an iterative process. This means that the design team and City of Jacksonville Beach staff worked directly with the public and stakeholders throughout the process to ensure that perspectives were consistently understood, considered, and reflected in project decisions.

The genesis of the plan originated with the public. A comprehensive and safe trail network usable for all ages was repeatedly mentioned at a series of Community meetings with the City Manager. In developing this Master Plan, two Community Workshops and six Stakeholder Meetings were held to gain input and opinions about the multi-use trail network. The first public meeting was a workshop held to engage the Community and identify objectives, concerns, and goals. The second meeting was held to demonstrate and conceptualize suggestions offered at the first meeting through examples and design ideas to ensure that the developing concepts were consistent with the information provided at the first workshop. The Stakeholder meetings were held to guide and develop the trail network and implementation plan.

Utilizing an open house format, several questions were posed to attendees and their responses were used to develop the corridors and design concepts.

QUESTION: WHAT WOULD BE YOUR PREFERRED MODE OF TRANSPORTATION ON THE TRAIL?

Overwhelmingly (73%), the community would use the trail system for walking and bicycling.


QUESTION: WHAT WOULD MAKE THE JACKSONVILLE BEACH URBAN TRAIL SYSTEM SUCCESSFUL?

Attendees indicated that a successful Jacksonville Beach trail system would provide connectivity throughout the community, be well organized and clearly defined, and be open to all typical multi-use trail modes. A consistent focus in public comments was safety. The system would need to provide clear separation from vehicles and trail users to create a safe and comfortable experience for all users.

QUESTION: WHAT WOULD DISCOURAGE YOU FROM USING THE URBAN TRAIL SYSTEM?

Considerations that would discourage trail use focused on a lack of safety. Interactions with higher speed vehicles such as golf carts, electric bikes, and electric scooters were also identified as issues that would discourage trail use. Using the existing sidewalk network as the trail system was also expressed as being insufficient for promoting trail use.

COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS

QUESTION: STICKY PLACES - WHAT PLACES HAVE STUCK WITH YOU? WHAT ARE MEMORABLE TRAILS?

Many examples were offered in response to this question, and while some of the trails mentioned were in urban settings, most were nature trails with an open nature experience—largely free from roadways and vehicles.

OUESTION: WHAT ARE THE SIGNIFICANT ORIGINS AND DESTINATIONS?


The most obvious focus for the multi-use trail network would be beach access. The community also desired access to the City's parks via the trail system. Additionally, many of the shopping areas were identified as destinations along the trail network.


COMMUNITY PROPOSED IDEAS

The first Public Workshop also included a map and comment exercise, where attendees could post sticky notes with suggestions along the map provided. This station received significant attention at the Workshop. The community was invited to introduce its ideal network features:



- Creating a loop system that would allow user experience more than just an "out and back" route.
- Use of the old landfill for a route and possible single-track off-road experience.
- Enhancements at major roadway crossing locations (especially A1A and Penman Road).







PUBLIC INFLUENCE ON NETWORK & DESIGN

The input from the two workshops played an important role in the network and design aspects of the multi-use trail.

NATURE TRAILS

The community's desire for a "nature trail" type of corridor lead to design that prioritized layout of the network across the widest possible rights-of-way. When possible, corridors were aligned to access open, natural areas.

SAFETY

The key aspects for safety focus on design and use. For the design, the goal is to provide as wide a trail as possible to minimize adverse interaction of uses. Additionally, the maximizing the space between the trail and roadway would produce the greatest level of safety. Operationally, consideration would need to be given to define trail use through speed limits and strict prohibitions of certain user types.

NETWORK HIERARCHY

Many of the streets throughout the City have sidewalks, thus a hierarchy of trails should allow users to work their way to primary trails. Sidewalks would provide local, immediate access to residences, while secondary trails would connect the sidewalks to primary trails.







MEMORABLE TRAILS

As part of the workshopping process, the public was asked to identify places or trail systems they had visited that left a lasting impression. Each of the responses were reviewed and the standout characteristics of the corridors or networks were factored into the priorities for Jacksonville Beach. One such place was adjacent to Jacksonville Beach, the Florida Boulevard Path located in Neptune Beach, FL; an urban trail path located within the road right-of-way but separated from vehicle travel lanes. Some of the other popular and memorable places are shown below:

STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

The City of Jacksonville Beach and professional consultants CHW, ADG, and AYRES presented to the public in a series of Stakeholder Meetings. The goal was to engage the public and provide information concerning the master plan as the project progressed and allow for comments to help guide the project.

Meetings were advertised through various mediums for public outreach, presented, and recorded. Communications and documentation of the presentations were posted on the City's website and social media.

The impact of stakeholder participation throughout the master planning process was extremely important in guiding the process' trajectory and outcomes, ensuring that many voices were being heard, documented, and considered. The developed Master Plan is truly the result of a robust public participation process that occurred at a variety of scales over the course of the project.
