Purpose of Briefing

The purpose of the briefing was to update the Council Members about ongoing items in the City.

City Manager Annual Review

Human Resources Director Ann Meuse provided a template for an evaluation she obtained from the International City/County Management Association (ICMA). The following recommendations were made:

- Supervision, staffing, and citizen relations reviews should be anonymous and conducted by department heads and citizens, not the City Council.
- Mr. Staffopoulos should complete his own self-evaluation discussing his objectives, accomplishments, and recommendations.
- Mr. Staffopoulos should be able to review and respond to the evaluations.
- Evaluations from Mr. Staffopoulos and department heads would be handed in before January 21, 2020. Councilmembers' evaluations would be handed in by January 29, 2020. Council would discuss all evaluations at the February 3, 2020 briefing, and be voted on at the Council meeting on the same evening.
- Councilmembers should consider a salary increase of between 3% and 6% to be in line with department heads' raises this year.

Backyard Hens Regulation

Senior Planner Heather Ireland explained the need to amend Chapter 5 of the Land Development Code. Attorney for the City, Denise May, reviewed other municipalities' language and made recommended changes.

The Council agreed to:

- Expand the existing language to indicate hens would not be permitted to trespass on other properties, be released, or set free.
- A one-time \$25 permit for keeping the hens would be required.
- Enclosures would be limited to 100 square feet and would not require a permit.
- Owners would be required to complete the Backyard Poultry Seminar in Duval County.

- Code Enforcement would enforce the ordinance, and the Special Magistrate would hear cases.
- Owners who neglected or abused their animal(s) would have their permits revoked.

City Attorney Duties

City Attorney Chris Ambrosio described his varied duties and explained local governments were entitled to seek reimbursement for their city attorneys' fees for time spent on litigation. A resolution would be needed to authorize the City Attorney to seek reimbursement for those fees. The resolution would strengthen Mr. Ambrosio's ability to recover his fees. Council suggested Mr. Ambrosio should draft the resolution.

Low-Speed Vehicle Research

Mr. Ambrosio stated he agreed with the City of Jacksonville's ordinance, which specifically addressed golf carts, but not low-speed vehicles. He stated a version of the City of Jacksonville's ordinance would be acceptable. Mr. Ambrosio stated the St. Johns County ordinance combined golf carts and low-speed vehicles in a way he did not believe to be correct. In the City of Jacksonville, golf cart use was restricted to golf cart paths. In St. Johns County, they mixed the concepts of golf cart paths and multi-use paths as well as golf cart communities and non-golf cart communities in unincorporated areas of the county. Mr. Ambrosio had found no authority to allow a low-speed vehicle to be used anywhere other than a street.

Lakeside Drive Gate

Council returned to the discussion of the gate issue, and it was suggested making the street wide enough, and the closed gate small enough, to accommodate a low-speed vehicle passing the closed gate. Mr. Ambrosio noted closing the gate would mean this was no longer a "public street," and therefore, the low-speed vehicles would be prohibited from using it. Mr. Ambrosio agreed to continue his research for a workable solution.

South Beach CRA TIF reduction

Mr. Staffopoulos stated the City no longer had the need to collect as much money for the South Beach Redevelopment area. \$4.5 million should be reallocated to their originating sources: \$3 million to Jacksonville and \$1.5 million to the city's general fund.

Chief Financial Officer Ashlie Gossett stated an agreement would need to be executed to reduce the TIF funds.

Mr. Staffopoulos indicated they were seeking to identify legitimate capital projects that made sense for the CRA. They must keep in mind the intent of the CRA: to eliminate slum and blight.

Other Announcements

Mr. Staffopoulos announced:

- The new Public Works Department director, Dennis Barron, would begin on January 6, 2020.
- He agreed to seek an update on the construction on South 2nd Street.
- The city employee holiday luncheon would be held on December 17, 2019, from 11:30 A.M. until 1:00 P.M. at the community center.

Motion: It was moved by Ms. Hoffman, seconded by Mr. Vogelsang, and passed unanimously to approve the following minutes:

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Ms. Golding stated she attended the Kids Play Free event at the city golf course. She thanked the Jax Beach Golf Association. She also attended Tuba Christmas at Deck the Chairs. She recognized the Police Department and CPAAA volunteers who put on the Kid's Christmas Party at Ace Hardware.

Mr. Staffopoulos advised this was the first year the City had entered the Deck the Chairs competition, and City staff put together a Ferris wheel, which took fifth place. He congratulated the staff who participated.

COURTESY OF THE FLOOR TO VISITORS:

- Jim Sorrell, 428 North 10th Avenue, requested a better forum for citizens to present inquiries and complaints. He felt the three minutes afforded during "Courtesy of the Floor to Visitors" was not sufficient to communicate concerns and people felt they were not being represented. He pointed out there was no appeal process for citizens who objected to ordinances. Mr. Sorrell also requested Council consider residential parking requirements.
- Ken Marsh, 2011 Gail Avenue, provided a recap of the city's year. He stated they had two opportunities for improvement in 2020: Communication/engagement between City Hall and citizens and the downtown vision plan.
- Gary Paetau, 725 Bonaire Circle, asked for additional information regarding the reduction of funding for the South Beach Community Redevelopment Association. He pointed out

not all projects in the 2012 study had been completed and wondered why they would return those funds.

Motion: It was moved by Ms. Hoffman and seconded by Mr. Vogelsang, to approve the dedication to the city and acceptance for maintenance of the public infrastructure improvements for Beach Marine Harborside Townhomes Phase 1 as described in the memorandum from the Public Works City Engineer dated December 9, 2019.

Mr. Staffopoulos said this would accept the installation of potable water lines at Beach Marine that would be owned and operated by the city. He stated the townhomes project was on hold while Beach Marine conducted due diligence regarding ownership issues.

Item #19-224 – Approve a Commercial Lease Agreement with Heart Utilities of Jacksonville, Inc. for Property at the Industrial Park

Motion: It was moved by Ms. Hoffman and seconded by Mr. Vogelsang, to authorize the City Manager and Mayor to execute a lease with Heart Utilities of Jacksonville, Inc. for property at the Jacksonville Beach Industrial Park as described in the memorandum from the Property and Procurement Officer dated December 9, 2019.

Mr. Staffopoulos reported this would allow Heart Utilities to be in an appropriately zoned area of the city. He stated they would access the property from the south.

Amended Motion: It was moved by Ms. Golding and seconded by Ms. Dumont, to amend the lease agreement to include language in 5A regarding the “pollution control plant odors.”

Motion: It was moved by Ms. Hoffman and seconded by Mr. Vogelsang, to approve the Sole Source Request for Spatial Business Systems, Inc. in the amount of \$82,000 for Spatial Business Systems, Inc. to provide and implement the automated utility design application.

Mr. Staffopoulos reported this would allow Beaches Energy employees to mark up as-built plans in real-time and upload the changes directly to the city’s AutoCAD system.

Motion: It was moved by Ms. Hoffman and seconded by Mr. Vogelsang, to approve an amount not to exceed \$150,000 as part of the overall lump sum contract price for preliminary engineering and geotechnical services that allows Burns & McDonnell to provide a full construction bid package consisting of all drawings, layouts, specifications, views and reports as per the attached December 6, 2019, letter Phase 1 development submission for Sampson substation autotransformer No. 2 replacement.

Brief Description of City Boards

Board of Adjustment (BOA)

- Meets 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Council Chambers at City Hall.
- The Board of Adjustment hears reviews, approves, approves with conditions, or denies variances to the terms of the Land Development Code. Board of Adjustment members is appointed by the City Council. **Five members appointed by City Council serve four-year terms, while two alternates serve two-year terms.** Eligibility criteria: must be a qualified elector and have two-year residency for the appointment. Although no specific experience requirements shall be necessary as a pre-requisite to appointment, consideration shall be given to applicants who have experience in planning, the law, architecture, natural resource management, real estate, and related fields. No member of the city council or a city employee may serve on the Board of Adjustment.

Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA)

- Meets the 4th Monday of each month at 5:00 P.M. in the Council Chambers at City Hall.
- The Community Redevelopment Agency is a five-member board appointed by the City Council and oversees two designated Community Redevelopment Districts within the City.
 - *The South Beach Redevelopment District is composed of approximately 356 acres near the intersection of J. Turner Butler Boulevard and west of Third Street (SR A1A).*
 - *The Downtown Redevelopment District is composed of 185 acres from 13th Avenue South to 9th Avenue North, and east of Third Street (SR A1A).*
- The CRA is responsible for implementing the redevelopment plan for each district as adopted by the City Council. As part of the implementation process, the CRA is responsible for marketing the areas, identifying developers, issuing Requests for Development Proposals, selection of developers, contract approving, financing plans, and monitoring contract implementation. **Five members appointed by City Council serve four-year terms.** Eligibility criteria: Reside in or be engaged in business within the area of operation of the agency, coterminous with the area of the county or municipality. The CRA is responsible to the City Council.

Planning Commission (PC)

- Meets the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Council Chambers at City Hall.
- The Planning Commission serves as the City's Local Planning Agency as required by Florida Statutes and primarily reviews and approves, approves with conditions, or disapproves Conditional Use Zoning applications. The Commission also hears requests for rezoning, text amendments, and comprehensive plan amendments, and makes recommendations to the City Council on their approvals. **Five members and two alternates appointed by City Council serve four-year terms.** Eligibility criteria: a qualified elector and two-year residency requirement for the appointment. Although no specific experience requirements shall be necessary as a prerequisite to appointment, consideration shall be given to applicants who have experience or education in planning, law, architecture, natural resource management, real estate, and related fields. No member of the city council or a city employee may serve on the Planning Commission.

Pension Boards of Trustees

- Meets quarterly (*February, May, August, November*) or more frequently, if needed.
- The City has three Retirement Systems: Firefighters', General Employees', and Police Officers'. 

DATE: December 11, 2019

ACTION REQUESTED

Appointment of a fifth member to serve on the General Employees' Retirement System Board of Trustees, respectively, is requested.

BACKGROUND

Pursuant to the Jacksonville Beach Code of Ordinances Section 2-162.23 (b) Board of Trustees, the General Employees' Board consists of (5) members:

- (1) Two (2) members of the City Council, selected by the City Council.
- (2) **A fifth member selected by the other four (4) members and appointed, as a ministerial act, by the city council. The fifth member may be a Retiree of this system.**
- (3) Two (2) members of the General Employees' Retirement System, other than Retirees, to be elected by the members of the General Employees' Retirement System.

At their November 12, 2019, Quarterly Pension Board meeting, the General Employees' Retirement System Board of Trustees voted unanimously to reappoint Brandon Maresma to serve as the fifth member. Mr. Maresma was originally appointed in November 2009.

Mr. Maresma has indicated he would be willing to serve another two-year term.

RECOMMENDATION

Reappoint Brandon Maresma to serve as a trustee as the fifth member on the General Employees' Retirement System Board, new two-year term to expire December 31, 2021.

Action Requested

Accept the monthly financial reports for the month of December 2019.

Summary

The Summary Budget Reports show the cumulative actual revenues and expenditures compared to the actual amounts at the same point in time as last fiscal year. Exhibit 7 of the Summary Budget Reports compares actual revenues and expenditures to budget in total by fund. These financial reports are prepared on a cash basis.

Exhibit 1 - General Fund Revenues

General Fund revenues are slightly ahead of last year on a percentage of budget basis. We received the annual ad valorem tax distributions in December, bringing the tax revenue-to-date to 65.08% of the annual budget. Growth in license and permit revenue reflects increased building permit activity including projects such as Whole Foods, Springhill Suites, and the Pier reconstruction.

Miscellaneous revenues in the General Fund include interest on pooled investments, auction proceeds, facility rental fees, tennis fees, and cemetery lots purchased.

Exhibit 2 - General Fund Expenditures

General Fund Expenditures are slightly ahead of prior year expenditures on a percentage of budget basis. Total year to date expenditures in the General Fund are under budget by 4.51%. Fire Department expenditures are higher than budgeted because of sick and vacation accrued leave payouts made to personnel as part of the Fire Services Agreement with the City of Jacksonville.

Exhibit 3 - Enterprise Fund Revenues

Enterprise Fund Revenues are 3.26% lower than the prior year revenues on a percentage of budget basis. Total year to date Enterprise Fund Revenues are 1.51% under amounts budgeted. The bulk power cost portion of the electric rate was suspended in October. Additionally, electric rates dropped by \$1 per 1,000kwh this month, reducing overall Electric revenues. The Golf Course year-to-year variance is a result of the course closing for renovations from January to November 2018.

Exhibit 4 - Enterprise Fund Expenditures

Total expenditures in the Enterprise Funds are 9.88% under budget for the current year. The year over year decrease in Electric expenses is due to lower power costs from the City's provider FMPA. Water & Sewer expenses were higher in the prior year primarily due to capital projects. The Sanitation Fund purchased a new street sweeper in the current year for \$213,891 attributing to the 2.99% variance from the prior year.

Exhibit 5 – Special Revenue Fund Revenues

Revenues in the Special Revenue Funds are 14.74% ahead of last year on a percentage basis. We received the annual tax increment distributions in December bringing revenue-to-date slightly over the annual budget. Convention Development Tax revenues have not been received from the City of Jacksonville.

Exhibit 6 - Special Revenue Fund Expenditures

In total, Special Revenue Fund expenditures are under budget for the current year but 4.02% higher than last year on a percentage of budget basis. Variances from the prior year in the Infrastructure Surtax, Downtown Increment, and Southend Increment Funds are primarily due to the timing of capital project expenditures.

Exhibit 7 - Summary Revenues and Expenditures

- The net income shown for the Electric Fund is overstated because monthly power bills are paid in arrears to FMPA.
- Convention Development Tax revenues have not yet been received from the City of Jacksonville causing a negative variance in budget-to-actual to date amounts.

 CURRENT YEAR VS PRIOR YEAR**





 CURRENT YEAR VS PRIOR YEAR**





 CURRENT YEAR VS PRIOR YEAR**





ACTION REQUESTED

Approve adding a second full-time Accounting Technician in the Finance Department.

BACKGROUND

The City currently has one Accounting Technician who is responsible for processing all outgoing payments, reconciling daily cash receipts for all City operations, and preparing month-end adjusting journal entries. In the last fiscal year, the Accounting Technician processed 6,000 vendor payments, 2,500 utility billing deposit refunds, and 13,000 payroll & pension payments. Prior to the recession, this work was performed by two full-time para-professional staff members. In 2009, one full time Accounting Technician position was replaced with a part-time Office Assistant.

The City implemented new financial software in 2018 that provides many new features, including approval workflow and record archiving within the system. Payment processing time has been improved with the electronic workflow and system users are able to search for documents using multiple data points. This change in business practice has improved internal controls and record archiving, but takes more staff time to administer.

A second Accounting Technician would assume the responsibility for invoice processing. This will allow us to process payments and reconciliations in a more timely manner. The additional position will also provide increased coverage in the Accounting Division, allowing for cross-training and more efficient daily operations.

We intend to keep the part-time Office Assistant position throughout the remainder of the ERP project while we continue to operate in two systems, which requires additional reconciliations and data validation. Once the project is completed, we anticipate being able to eliminate the part-time position.

The annual estimated cost of adding a second Accounting Technician in the Finance Department is \$67,464. The funding will be included in the mid-year budget modification.

BACKGROUND

This project is part of the City's 2019 Capital Improvement and Business Plans. This project involves rehabilitation of the sanitary sewer lift station located in the southeast corner of the South Beach Parkway Plaza, behind the Target store and adjacent to the shopping center access road and Marsh Landing Parkway. Major work includes complete rehabilitation of the existing duplex lift station including equipment and structure demolition and abandonment, limited site clearing and vegetation removal, replacement of chain link fencing around lift station site, installation of new precast concrete wet well and manhole with coating system, pumps, piping, valves, control panel, telemetry and SCADA equipment, bypassing operations, site light, new concrete slab and new concrete driveway.

The City advertised the project to fifteen (15) contractors on October 23, 2019, and seven (7) contractors submitted bids for the project. The bids were evaluated for conformance with the criteria set forth in the bidding documents. The total base bids from the contractors ranged from \$444,067.50 to \$564,500.00. This letter summarizes the construction contract bids received for the Lift Station #29 Rehabilitation project. The City of Jacksonville Beach (City) received bids for the project on December 11, 2019, at 2:00 pm. Seven (7) contractors submitted bids for the project. The bids were evaluated for conformance with the criteria set forth in the bidding documents. The total base bids from the contractors ranged from \$444,067.50 to \$564,500.00.

PBM Constructors, Inc. submitted the lowest bid. Four Waters Engineering (4Waters) has reviewed the submitted bid package provided by PBM Constructors, Inc. and finds their bid responsive and responsible. All required items were acknowledged on the Bid Form and included with the bid package. A 5% Bid Bond was provided and the Bid Bond surety is licensed in Florida and has an AM Best Rating of "A". Qualifications and reference projects and contacts were included with the bid package. State licensing was provided; however, local licensing documentation may need to be provided prior to final execution of a contract.

4Waters also investigated the contractor's experience, and reputation, and finds the contractor capable of performing the work for this project based on the information received from reference contacts.



ACTION REQUESTED

Adopt Resolution Number 2048-2020, establishing and adopting a Code of Ethics for Public Officials for the City of Jacksonville Beach. This resolution has no financial impact to the City of Jacksonville Beach.

BACKGROUND

In 2019, City Council indicated they would like a Code of Ethics to provide guidance on behavior for each elected official, board appointee, and appointed official within the City. In September 2019, a discussion of a draft document was held at a Council briefing. Council was content with the document, with discussion ensuing on authority for interpretations of the Code. Council direction to staff was to edit the document such that the City Attorney's written findings on individual issues would be binding on the Council.

Since that direction, the City has hired a full-time, in-house City Attorney. Upon review of the document, and considering direction from Council from the September briefing, additional modifications to specific sections have been made to the Code by the City Attorney and City Manager, including:

- E. Public Meetings - add arriving late to scheduled meetings and briefings
- G. Communication – address quasi-judicial proceedings
- S. Notice from Council – add to the document
- T. City Attorney to Render Opinion – modified based on City Attorney review; binding nature of the City Attorney's findings reduced to opinion
- U. Florida Statutes – modified based on City Attorney review; incorporation of Florida Commission on Ethics and ancillary documents

RESOLUTION NO. 2048-2020

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, ESTABLISHING AND ADOPTING A CODE OF ETHICS FOR PUBLIC OFFICIALS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS AND OFFICIAL DECISIONS, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville Beach is committed to accountable and responsible governance, personal integrity, and the highest standards of ethical conduct from its public officials in performance of their official public duties; and

WHEREAS, Federal and Florida laws and the Florida Commission on Ethics provide mandatory laws, regulations and guidance for public officials in carrying out their public responsibilities and to maintain public trust and integrity in local government; and

WHEREAS, the Code of Ethics for Public Officers and Employees, Part III of Chapter 112, Florida Statutes, contains standards of ethical conduct and disclosures applicable to public officers and employees, among others, in local government; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the City Council for the City of Jacksonville Beach that all public officials, including elected officials, appointed officials and members of boards, commissions, and committees perform their duties in compliance with all requirements of Florida laws, the City Charter and a City Code of Ethics for Public Officials; and

WHEREAS, the City Council expects all City public officials to comply with all ethics laws, and it recognizes the value and importance of adopting a City Code of Ethics to provide additional guidelines, expectations and requirements for all public officials serving the City that will benefit public trust, City staff and City residents, taxpayers, and businesses.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby fully incorporated herein by this reference and are deemed a material part of this Resolution.

SECTION 2. That the City of Jacksonville Beach hereby adopts and immediately implements its City Code of Ethics for Public Officials as it is presented in Attachment A to this Resolution and as it may be revised and amended by the City Council from time to time in the future.

SECTION 3. All ordinances, resolutions, official determinations or parts thereof previously adopted or entered by the City or any of its officials and in conflict with this Resolution are repealed to the extent of conflict or inconsistency herewith.

SECTION 4. This Resolution and the Code of Ethics for Public Officials shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

CODE OF ETHICS for PUBLIC OFFICIALS
(City Council, Appointed Officials, Boards, Commissions, Committees)

DECLARATION OF POLICY

It is the policy of the City of Jacksonville Beach to uphold, promote, and demand ethical conduct from its elected and appointed public officials. The citizens and businesses of the City of Jacksonville Beach are entitled to have fair, ethical, and accountable local government. As members of the City Council, we recognize the importance of codifying and making known to the general public the ethical principles and law that guide the work of public officials. Public officials are to maintain the highest standards of personal integrity, truthfulness, and fairness in carrying out their public duties.

In order to fulfill this mission, the City of Jacksonville Beach hereby adopts a Code of Ethics for public officials to assure public confidence in the integrity of local government and its effective and fair operation. The Code of Ethics expresses standards of ethical conduct expected for all public officials, including elected officials (City Council), appointed officials (City Manager and City Attorney), and members of boards, commissions, and committees. Public officials themselves have the primary responsibility to assure that ethical standards are understood and met, and that the public can continue to have full confidence in the integrity of government.

APPLICABLE LAWS AND POLICIES

A. Responsibility of Public Office

Stewardship of the public interest shall be the public official's primary concern, working for the common good of the citizens of the City of Jacksonville Beach, and avoiding actions that are inconsistent with the best interests of the City. All persons, claims, and transactions coming before the City Council or any City board, commission, or committee, shall be assured of fair and equal treatment.

B. Compliance with Law

Public officials are agents of public purpose and hold office for the benefit of the public. They are bound to uphold the laws of the nation, state, county, and municipality, and to carry out impartially these laws in the performance of their public duties to foster respect for all government. These laws include, but are not limited to, the United States and Florida Constitutions, Florida statutes and City ordinances.

C. Conduct of Officials

The professional and personal conduct of public officials shall be above reproach and avoid even the appearance of impropriety. Public officials shall refrain from abusive conduct, personal charges or verbal attacks upon the character or motives of other members of Council, boards, commissions, committees, City staff, or the public.

D. Performance of Duties

1. Public officials shall perform their duties in accordance with the processes and rules of order established by the City Council, boards, commissions, and committees, governing the deliberation of public policy issues, meaningful

involvement of the public, and implementation of policy decisions of the City Council by City staff.

2. Public officials shall be loyal to the political objectives expressed by the electorate and the programs developed to attain those objectives.
3. Public officials shall not undertake actions or communications that subvert an action formally taken by City Council.

E. Public Meetings

Public officials shall prepare themselves for all meetings, both public and shade. Officials shall listen courteously and attentively to all public discussion before the body, and focus on the business at hand. Officials shall refrain from:

- interrupting other speakers
- making personal comments not germane to the business of the body
- taking or making phone calls
- reading or sending texts
- participating in any other actions that would interfere with the orderly conduct of meetings
- using inappropriate language
- arriving late to scheduled meetings and briefings

F. Decisions Based on Merit and Evidence

Public officials shall base their decisions on the merits and substance of the matter at hand, and on competent and substantial evidence when performing in a quasi-judicial capacity.

G. Communication

Public officials shall publicly share with the body substantive information that is relevant to a matter under consideration by the Council or boards, commissions, and committees, which they may have received from sources outside the public decision-making process. In the context of quasi-judicial proceedings, before final action or vote are taken on the matter, the public official must disclose any ex-parte communication he or she received, identifying the party and the substance of the subject matter that was communicated. Any written form of ex-parte communication must be made a part of the record before final action or vote is taken.

H. Conflict of Interest

1. In order to assure independence and impartiality on behalf of the common good, public officials shall not use their official positions to influence government decisions in which they have a material financial interest or personal relationship, which may give the appearance of a conflict of interest. In accordance with law, officials shall disclose investments, interests in real property, sources of income

and gifts, and shall abstain from participating in deliberations and decision-making where conflicts may exist.

2. Public officials shall not engage in or accept private employment or render service for private interests when such employment or service:
 - a. is incompatible with the proper discharge of his/her official duties;
 - b. impairs independence of judgment or action in the performance of official duties;
 - c. is contrary to the interests of the City.
3. Public officials should avoid action or speech, whether or not specifically prohibited, which might result in or create the appearance of:
 - a. using public office for private gain;
 - b. offering preferential treatment to any person;
 - c. impeding City efficiency or economy;
 - d. being contrary to the interests of the City;
 - e. losing complete independence or impartiality;
 - f. making a City decision outside of official channels;
 - g. degrading public confidence in the integrity of the City.

I. Gifts, Gratuities, and Favors

Public officials shall comply with the requirements of Section 112.3148, Florida Statutes, relating to the acceptance and reporting of gifts, gratuities, and favors.

J. Confidentiality of Information

Public officials shall not disclose or furnish to anyone any information concerning City property, personnel, litigation, or proceedings of the City, other than public information or with legal authorization that was obtained as a result of their positions with the City. This shall not be construed to limit, hinder, or prevent the divulgence or use of information in the performance of official duties, but shall prohibit the use of or providing information that would place the official or the recipient in a vantage position over the general public and thereby constitute a violation of public trust. Confidential information shall include, but not be limited to, any written information which is not subject to disclosure pursuant to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, or any other statutory exemption regarding public records or any oral information which was not discussed at a public meeting.

K. Use of Public Resources

1. Unless specifically permitted by City policy, the use of City facilities, equipment, vehicles, supplies, on-duty personnel, or other goods or services is limited to City business. Public resources may not be used for private gain or personal purposes except on the same basis that they are otherwise normally available to the public. Normal rental or usage fees may not be waived except in accordance with City policy.
2. A public official may use the City's name, letterhead, logo, or seal only when it would be perceived as representing the City of Jacksonville Beach or the body as a whole and only with the prior consent of Council. However, this provision will not prohibit individual councilmembers from using City letterhead and resources to write personal congratulatory letters. Letters of recommendations, references,

endorsements, and such, may be written by councilmembers on City letterhead, with a copy being provided to each councilmember.

3. A public official shall not utilize the City's name, letterhead, logo, or seal for the purpose of endorsing any political candidate, business, commercial product, or service.

L. Representative of Private Interests

As stewards of the public interest, members of the City Council shall not appear on behalf of the private interests of third parties before the Council or any board, commission, committee, or proceeding of the City. Public officials of boards, commissions, and committees shall not appear before their own bodies or before the City Council on behalf of the private interest of third parties on matters related to the areas of service of their bodies.

M. Advocacy

Public officials shall represent the official policies or positions of the City Council, board, commission, or committee to the best of their abilities when designated as delegates for this purpose. When presenting their individual opinions and positions, officials shall explicitly state that they do not represent their body or the City of Jacksonville Beach, nor give the inference that they do.

N. Policy Role of Members

Public officials shall respect and adhere to the Council-Manager form of government as outlined in the City Charter and Council's Policies and Procedures with respect to the City Manager's relationship with the City Council. In this structure, the City Council determines the policies of the City with advice, information, and analysis provided by the public, boards, commissions, committees, and City staff. Except as provided by City Charter or ordinance, councilmembers shall not interfere with the administrative functions of the City or the professional duties of City staff, or impair the ability of staff to implement Council policy decisions.

O. Independence of Boards, Commissions, and Committees

The value of independent advice and recommendations of boards, commissions, and committees to the public decision-making process is of such significance, that members of Council shall refrain from using their position to influence unduly the deliberations or outcome of board, commission, and committee proceedings.

P. Harassment

The City strongly disapproves of and does not tolerate harassment of any kind. Public officials shall avoid offensive or inappropriate harassing behavior. Complaints of harassment will be promptly and carefully investigated in accordance with the City's applicable Workplace Violence and Sexual Harassment policies.

Q. Positive Work Place Environment

Public officials shall support the maintenance of a positive and constructive work place environment for City employees and for citizens and businesses dealing with the City.

Officials shall recognize their roles in dealings with City employees (as established by Charter) and refrain from creating the perception of inappropriate direction to staff.

1. Officials, acting as a resident of the City and requiring contact with City employees, shall do so in a positive, professional and courteous manner in accordance with this code.
2. Officials, acting on behalf of their employment and requiring contact with City employees, shall first contact the City Manager to determine acceptability and/or conditions of such contact. In the event contact will be frequent or routine, appropriate guidelines may be established by the City Manager so as not to hinder the Official's performance of their employment.
3. Officials, acting as a member or representative for a non-profit civic organization or group and requesting contact with City employees, shall first contact the City Manager to determine acceptability and/or conditions of such contact.
4. Officials seeking to volunteer within the City organization shall recognize that this is a privilege, and first seek authorization from the City Manager. If acceptable, the City Manager may approve a request, identifying department, division and frequency for volunteer activities. Communication with staff while volunteering shall adhere to the context and intent of this code and City Charter. The City Manager, in his/her sole discretion, reserves the right to cancel an Official's volunteer privilege at any time.

R. Notice to Council

Should either the City Attorney or City Manager become aware of potential conflicts with this Code, a written document shall be prepared by either or both parties detailing the facts of the potential conflict, and shall publish such document for the consideration of the City Council. Upon direction from the City Council, the City Attorney and City Manager shall fully investigate the potential conflict, and the City Attorney shall produce a written report with any additional information.

S. Notice from Council

Should any City Council member become aware of potential conflict with this Code, the Council member shall prepare a written document detailing the facts of the potential conflict, and provide such document for the consideration of the City Council. Upon direction from the City Council, the City Attorney and City Manager shall fully investigate the potential conflict, and the City Attorney shall produce a written report with any additional information.

T. City Attorney to Render Opinion

Whenever any public official, subject to this policy, is in doubt as to the proper interpretation or application of this Code of Ethics policy prior to a potential conflict occurring, that official may submit to the City Attorney a full written statement of the facts and questions. The City Attorney shall then render a written opinion that addresses the potential conflict to all officials without use of the name of the official advised.. If material facts relating to the potential conflict change then the public official must promptly notify the City Attorney of any changes.

U. FLORIDA STATUTES (CHAPTER 112, PARTIII)

1. Chapter 112, Part III, Florida Statutes, Code of Ethics for Public Officers and Employees, prescribes appropriate standards of ethical conduct for employees and elected and appointed officials, as well as reporting and investigative procedures in response to prohibited actions. The City of Jacksonville Beach Code

of Ethics is to be used as a supplement to the statutes. Should any conflicts exist between the codes, the more stringent language of the two shall prevail. Public officials are encouraged to read the most recent version of the Florida Commission on Ethics Guide to the Sunshine Amendment and Code of Ethics for Public Officers and Employees.

2. Public officials required to file an annual financial disclosure form, submitted in accordance with Section 112, Florida Statutes, shall file a copy with the Office of the City Clerk, using the forms prescribed by the Commission on Ethics.

V. IMPLEMENTATION

1. The Code of Ethics for the public officials of the City of Jacksonville Beach is intended to be self-enforcing. Interpretation and enforcement of this Code lies solely with the City Council. It therefore becomes most effective when officials are thoroughly familiar with it and embraces its provisions. For this reason, ethical standards shall be included in the regular orientation for candidates for the City Council, newly elected officials, and appointed members of boards, commissions, and committees, as held.
2. Officials entering office will receive a statement certifying they have read and understand the City of Jacksonville Beach Code of Ethics. Signing the statement is optional. All public officials are subject to the provisions of the Code of Ethics whether or not the statement is signed.
3. The Code of Ethics shall be reviewed annually by the City Council, boards, commissions, and committees. Recommendations received from the review shall be considered by the City Council. The Code of Ethics shall be updated, as necessary, in November of even-numbered years.

W. PENALTIES

1. Code violations by Boards, Commissions, and Committees may result in the following penalties:
 - a. verbal reprimand, issued orally in open session;
 - b. written reprimand;
 - c. suspension in the form of a temporary cessation of duties;
 - d. forfeiture of appointment or position.
2. Code violations by Appointed Officials and Council members may result in the following penalties:
 - a. verbal reprimand, issued orally in open session;
 - b. written reprimand;
 - c. suspension or removal from any appointed boards or committees
3. The authority and process for removal of an Appointed Official shall be reserved for the City Charter and/or employment agreement.
4. The authority and process for removal of a seated Council member shall be reserved for the City Charter.

BACKGROUND

The City of Jacksonville Beach now has a full time, in-house City Attorney on salary. Part of the City Attorney's duties is to prosecute actions and defend cases on behalf of the City, Beaches Energy Services and the Police Department (collectively "City"). The City Attorney may serve as the sole litigator, lead litigator or as co-counsel depending on the case that the City is a party to. Florida case law authorizes government entities, such as the City, to seek reimbursement for its City Attorney's expert legal services at the prevailing reasonable rate in the community even if that amount exceeds the cost of the particular attorney's compensation package (salary plus benefits). Resolution No. 2049-2020 directs the City Attorney to attempt to seek reimbursement at the rate of \$300.00 per hour when allowed in cases. This amount falls within the acceptable and customary range of attorney's fees charged by litigation attorneys practicing in North and Central Florida, possessing similar skill, experience, and competence in civil litigation representing local governments as that of the City Attorney.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 2049-2020 directing the City Attorney to seek reimbursement of the City Attorney's legal services fees at the prevailing reasonable hourly rate in cases which the City, Beaches Energy Services and/or the Police Department are parties.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, ESTABLISHING THE RATE FOR ATTORNEY FEES TO BE SOUGHT BY THE CITY ATTORNEY FOR REIMBURSEMENT UNDER THE CITY CHARTER CHAPTER VI, SECTION 37 AND AS AUTHORIZED BY CONTROLLING CASE LAW.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the City of Jacksonville Beach Charter Chapter VI, Section 37 the City Attorney shall prosecute and defend the City, for and on behalf of the City, all complaints, suits, and proceedings (collectively “cases”) in which the City is a party; and

WHEREAS, the City Attorney litigates cases and serves as litigation co-counsel on behalf of the City, Beaches Energy Services and the City Police Department which often result in the City being entitled to recover its attorney’s fees expended to defend or prosecute the cases; and

WHEREAS, litigation causes the City Attorney and staff to expend time and costs which reduces the time and resources available to perform other critical City work, and burdens legal and other City departments, and the City’s public funds; and

WHEREAS, Florida case law authorizes government entities, such as the City, to seek reimbursement for its in-house City Attorney’s expert legal services at the prevailing reasonable rate in the community even if that amount exceeds the cost of the particular attorney’s compensation package (salary plus benefits); *see* City of Boca Raton v. Faith Baptist Church, 423 So.2d 1021 (Fla. 4th DCA 1982); Liebowitz v. City of Miami Beach, 683 So.2d 204 (Fla. 3d DCA 1996); Computer Task Group, Inc. v. Palm Beach County, 782 So.2d 942 (Fla. 4th DCA 2001); Broward Marine, Inc. v. Palm Beach Polo Holdings, Inc., 902 So.2d 855 (Fla. 4th DCA 2005); and

WHEREAS, the City Council has been advised of the Florida case law opinions and finds the rate of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per hour falls within the acceptable and customary range of attorney’s fees charged by litigation attorneys practicing in North and Central Florida, possessing similar skill, experience, and competence in civil litigation specializing in local government as that of the City’s Florida Bar Board Certified Specialist City Attorney.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby fully incorporated herein by this reference and are deemed a material part of this Resolution.

SECTION 2. The City Attorney is instructed to attempt to obtain reimbursement for the attorney's fees expended in litigation at the rate of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per hour in any case in which the City, Beaches Energy Services and the City Police Department may be entitled to reimbursement. This rate may be adjusted from time to time by a subsequent vote of the City Council after a public hearing.

SECTION 3. All ordinances, resolutions, official determinations or parts thereof previously adopted or entered by the City or any of its officials and in conflict with this Resolution are repealed to the extent of conflict or inconsistency herewith.

SECTION 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ACTION REQUESTED

Adopt Ordinance 2019-8130 following its Second Reading, to revise the City's Code of Ordinances Section 8-1 Form of Burial Easement to eliminate reference to "lineal" descendants, and add "collateral heirs", to enable transfer of burial rights to all descendants and collateral heirs of a decedent.

BACKGROUND

Section 8.1 of the City's Code of Ordinances provides a Form of Burial Easement used to record the sale of burial lots at H. Warren Smith and Lee Kirkland cemeteries. As Grantor, the City grants and conveys a perpetual easement to the cemetery lot to the Grantee.

The current Form of Burial Easement limits burial rights to the grantee and family which is deemed to be the surviving spouse and lineal descendants.

Lineal descendants are blood relatives in the direct line of descent such as children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and are distinguished from collateral heirs, which include the line of siblings, nieces, nephews, cousins, aunts and uncles.

Based on the number of requests we received to transfer burial rights by collateral heirs, staff compared burial rights transfers among nine (9) municipalities within the State of Florida. The City Attorney also compared six (6)

additional municipalities. None of the municipalities restrict transfer to lineal descendants. (A summary of the comparison is attached).

Staff recommend removing the reference to lineal from the Form of Burial Easement and add collateral heirs to enable transfer of burial rights to all descendants and collateral heirs of a decedent.

The City Council met on December 16, 2019 and voted unanimously to approve the ordinance on its First Reading.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Ordinance 2019-8130 following its Second Reading, to revise the Form of Burial Easement to eliminate reference to lineal descendants, and add collateral heirs, to enable transfer of burial rights to all descendants and collateral heirs, as described in the memorandum from the Director of Parks and Recreation, dated December 23, 2019.

The transfer or assignment must be executed in the office of the cemetery, and upon forms provided by the city. The original burial right agreement must be presented at the time application for transfer is made.

(B) In the event the original burial right owner desires to sell his interest in lots or plots, the city shall have the first right of refusal to purchase the lots or plots from him at the original cost. Should the city fail within seven days to exercise its right of first refusal, then the original burial right owner may sell his lots or plots elsewhere. Should notification of the owner's desire to sell be received by the city during a month when the City Commission is in recess, 30 days shall be added to the time within which the city must exercise its right of first refusal.

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-8130

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 8, “CEMETERIES”, OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, CODE OF ORDINANCES BY AMENDING SECTION 8-1. “LOTS-PURCHASE EASEMENT FORM”; PROVIDING FOR FINDINGS; DELETING THE TERM “LINEAL”; ADDING THE TERM “COLLATERAL HEIRS”; REVISING THE PURCHASE EASEMENT FORM; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville Beach has the authority to adopt this Ordinance pursuant to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida; Chapters 163 & 166, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 497 “the “Florida Funeral, Cemetery, and Consumer Services Act” of the Florida Statutes, does not use or define the term “lineal descendant”; and municipal cemeteries are generally exempt from the provisions of Chapter 497 relating to cemeteries; and

WHEREAS, “Collateral heir” means an heir who is related to the decedent through a common ancestor but who is not an ancestor or descendant of the decedent, which includes siblings, cousins, nieces, nephews, aunts and uncles of the decedent §731.201(6), Fla. Stat., and “Descendant” means a person in any generational level down the applicable individual’s descending line and includes children, grandchildren, and more remote descendants. §731.201(9), Fla. Stat. The term “descendant” is synonymous with the terms “lineal descendant” and “issue” but excludes collateral heirs. §731.201(9), Fla. Stat.; and

WHEREAS, research of many Florida municipalities shows that their Code of Ordinances and cemetery policies and regulations do not utilize the term “lineal” and don’t limit transfer of burial rights to lineal descendants, a sample of these municipalities include, Dunedin, Fernandina Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Fort Myers, Jacksonville, Kissimmee, Lake Wales, Melbourne, Ocala, Ocoee, Orange Park, Orlando, Palatka, Pompano Beach, and Tampa; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Jacksonville Beach finds the proposed ordinance will serve to protect the health, welfare and safety of residents and the regulation and use of municipal cemeteries, and the general exercise of burial easement rights.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. Recitals. The above recitals are ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are made a part of this Ordinance and adopted as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. Amendment of City Code.¹ That Section 8-1 “Lots-Purchase easement form”, of Chapter 8 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Jacksonville Beach, Florida, is hereby amended and ordained to read as follows:

Sec. 8-1. Lots-Purchase easement form.

For the consideration now or hereafter fixed by the city council for the purchase price, upon payment thereof, a conveyance in the form herein specified shall be made and issued to the purchaser of cemetery lots, executed in the name of the city by the mayor and city manager and attested by the city clerk under the seal of the city and duly acknowledged by such officer.

FORM OF BURIAL EASEMENT

Know all men by these present: That pursuant to the Code of Ordinances of Jacksonville Beach, Florida, and in consideration of \$ _____, the City of Jacksonville Beach, a municipal corporation, hereby grants and conveys to _____ as Grantee, a Perpetual Easement in the Cemetery Lot herein described, subject to the reservation of the fee in the said City for control of management and improvement and adoption of regulations essential to the uniform, orderly operation of the Cemetery; Section _____ Block _____ Lot _____ Grave No. _____ as shown on plat prepared by City of Jacksonville Beach Engineering Department and accepted by the City Council of Jacksonville Beach at its regular meeting on April 1, 1957, said plat being filed with the City Clerk of the City of Jacksonville Beach, Florida.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same for the burial of grantee and family, deemed herein to be the surviving spouse and ~~lineal~~ descendants and collateral heirs of grantee; the surviving spouse being first vested during life with the exercise of easement in control and care of lot, and thence to the ~~lineal~~ descendants and collateral heirs; providing the grantee may by will or indenture appoint any person or corporation as executor or personal representative to exercise the right of easement limited or in perpetuity. The rights granted by this easement cannot be sold or assigned except back to the grantor.

ACTION REQUESTED

Adopt Ordinance No. 2020-8131, to amend Section 34-41 and 34-392 of the Jacksonville Beach Land Development Code (LDC) related to permitting hens as household pets.

BACKGROUND

Following a complaint to both the City's animal control and code enforcement officers regarding the keeping of chickens and other animals on a residential lot, the property owner approached Planning and Development Department staff to inquire about identified conflicts in the City's codes and to discuss a possible resolution. Currently, the LDC exists partly in conflict with Chapter 5 of the City Code of Ordinances that addresses "Animals and Fowl".

Residential zoning districts permit doghouses and similar structures for housing household pets. Under Article IV. Definitions in the LDC, household pets include dogs, cats, hamsters, and birds, but specifically excludes poultry. So while the "Animals and Fowl" section of Chapter 5 of the City Code may not prohibit certain livestock animals, the LDC prohibits residents from providing the required housing or pens for them based on the LDC definition of what is currently considered a household pet.

The proposed LDC text amendments were originally presented to the Planning Commission on May 28, 2019. Following several discussions between the applicant, staff and the City's attorney, the application was deferred and considered at the September 23, 2019 Planning Commission meeting.

After additional review and discussion it was determined that while, at minimum, the definition of household pets in the LDC should be amended to permit hens, the



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bulk of the code changes proposed would be more appropriately placed under Code of Ordinances, Chapter 5 – “Animals and Fowl”. Since Chapter 5 is not part of the LDC, it cannot be changed through the Planning Commission. The proposed regulations for permitting hens and changes to Chapter 5 are provided separately under Ordinance No. 2019-8132 and submitted for first reading on the Council’s January 21, 2020 agenda.

The final proposed changes to amend Sections 34-41 and 34-392 of the LDC in Ordinance No. 2020-8131 include the following:

1. Amend the definition of household pets to include hens.
2. Limit the number of hens per household to five (5).

The Planning Commission met and conducted a public hearing on Monday, September 23, 2019 and voted to recommend denial of the proposed LDC text amendments by the City Council based on some concerns about the potential for diseases and decreased property values.

If Ordinance No. 2020-8131 is denied by the City Council as recommended by the Planning Commission, then companion Ordinance No. 2020-8132, amending Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, should also be denied.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Ordinance No. 2020-8131, to amend Sections 34-41 and 34-392 of the Jacksonville Beach Land Development Code related to permitting hens as household pets.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-8131

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 34, ARTICLE IV, SECTION 34-41 AND ARTICLE VIII, DIVISION 2, SECTION 34-392 OF THE LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, AMENDING THE DEFINITION OF HOUSEHOLD PETS TO INCLUDE FEMALE CHICKENS, AND AMENDING THE SITE DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS ACCESSORY USES AND STRUCTURES TO PERMIT FEMALE CHICKENS IN RESIDENTIAL ZONING DISTRICTS, ADDING CATS, DOGS, HAMSTERS AND BIRDS AS EXAMPLE HOUSEHOLD PETS; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ALL ORDINANCES AND OFFICAL ACTS IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville Beach has the authority to adopt this Ordinance pursuant to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida; and Chapters 163 & 166, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, many communities in Florida and throughout the United States have implemented regulations regarding the permitting and keeping of backyard female chickens (hens) in urban settings; and

WHEREAS, residents of the City of Jacksonville Beach living in residentially zoned areas that are not currently permitted to keep hens have indicated a desire to do so; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the application, all relevant support materials, the staff report, the recommendation of the Planning Commission, and public testimony given at the public hearings concerning the keeping of hens as household pets where permitted upon lands in the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. RECITALS. The above recitals are ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are made a part of this Ordinance and adopted as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT TO THE CITY LDC¹. That Article IV. Section 34-41. Definitions of the Land Development Code is hereby amended as follows:

Pets, household means any domestic animal such as cats, dogs, hamsters, and birds, and hens other than poultry that are customarily kept for personal use including collection of eggs and/or enjoyment within the home or residential lot. Other Poultry, hooped animals of any type, predatory animals, or any animal which is normally raised to provide food for slaughter or commercial sale for people shall not be considered as household pets.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT TO THE CITY LDC. That Article VIII. Site Development Standards. Division 2. Supplemental Standards. Section 34-392. Accessory uses and structures of the Land Development Code is hereby amended as follows:

- (2) *Household pets.* Household pets, like cats, dogs, hamsters, or birds, along with related doghouses and pens, are a permitted accessory use to residential uses in all zoning districts, provided the number of such pets over six (6) months in age shall not exceed three (3), and the keeping of four (4) or more dogs, six (6) months of age or older, shall be considered a kennel. Hens as household pets are limited to five (5) where permitted upon lands in the City.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY. That if any section, subsection, clause or provision of this ordinance is held invalid, the remainder shall not be affected by such invalidity.

SECTION 5. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND ACTS. All ordinances, resolutions, official determinations or parts thereof previously adopted or entered into by the City or any of its officials and that are in conflict with this ordinance are repealed to the extent inconsistent herewith.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its adoption by the City Council.

ACTION REQUESTED

Adopt Ordinance No. 2020-8132, to amend Chapter 5. Animals and Fowl of the City Code of Ordinances creating a new subsection related to regulating the keeping of hens as household pets on residential property.

BACKGROUND

As it relates to Ordinance Number 2020-8131 to amend the Land Development Code (LDC) to add hens to the definition of a household pet, specific regulations for keeping hens are being proposed as an addition to Chapter 5. Animals and Fowl. While the Animals and Fowl section of Chapter 5 of the City Code of Ordinances does not specifically prohibit hens, it currently does not provide detailed regulations for keeping them on properties within the city.

The proposed additions to Chapter 5. Animals and Fowl have been drafted to be similar in substance to the regulations of Neptune and Atlantic Beach that have both recently permitted hens on residential properties with an issued permit.

The proposed additions to Chapter 5. Animals and Fowl include the following:

1. Definitions of "coop", "enclosed pen" and "hen";
2. Requirements related to the keeping of hens;
3. Regulations on enclosed pen and coop sizes and construction;
4. Permit details and cost, including a requirement to complete the Duval County Backyard Poultry Seminar;



5. Details on where hens will be permitted; and
6. Enforcement of regulations.

If approved, city staff will develop an application for residential hen permits beginning on an effective date provided by city council.

If companion Ordinance No. 2020-8131, amending the Land Development Code relative to household pets and hens, is approved, then Ordinance No 2020-8132 should also be approved. Conversely, if Ordinance No. 2020-8131 is denied, then Ordinance No 2020-8132 should also be denied.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Ordinance No. 2020-8132, to amend Chapter 5. Animals and Fowl of the City Code of Ordinances creating a new subsection related to regulating the keeping of hens as household pets on residential property.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-8132

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA AMENDING CHAPTER 5. ANIMALS AND FOWL, ADDING ARTICLE IV. BACKYARD HENS, PROVIDING PURPOSE AND INTENT; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR GENERAL REQUIREMENTS; REQUIRING PERMITS; PROVIDING FOR PERMITTED ZONING LOCATIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE:

WHEREAS, Article VIII, Section 2 of the Florida Constitution provides that municipalities shall have governmental, corporate and proprietary powers to enable municipalities to conduct municipal government, perform municipal functions and render municipal services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the referenced provision of the Florida Constitution, the City of Jacksonville Beach may exercise any power for municipal purposes except as otherwise provided by law; and

WHEREAS, the importance of sustainability and local food sourcing has inspired an interest in backyard and community food production within the City limits; and

WHEREAS, many communities in Florida and throughout the United States have been exploring and implementing programs to integrate the keeping of backyard hens into urban and suburban residential settings; and

WHEREAS, chickens are social animals and can make good pets but should be limited for proper integration and reduction of potential nuisance to surrounding residential homes; and

WHEREAS, data indicates that five (5) hens are sufficient to meet the needs of the average family's egg consumption; and

WHEREAS, residents of the City residing in residential zones have indicated a desire to provide for the raising and keeping of backyard hens and seeking proper regulation thereof; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Jacksonville Beach finds the proposed ordinance will serve to protect the health and safety of residents, adjacent residential uses, and the general neighborhood.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. Recitals. The above recitals are ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are made a part of this Ordinance and adopted as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. Amendment of City Code. That Chapter 5, Article IV is hereby created to read as follows: ¹

Section 5-80. Purpose and intent.

- (a) The purpose of this Article is to authorize and regulate the keeping of backyard hens in specified residential zones under specified criteria within the City of Jacksonville Beach. To establish the criteria and limitations so as to avoid adverse impacts on neighboring properties and residents and to provide for the safety and health of hens. Nothing herein shall supersede any effective, recorded deed restriction prohibiting backyard hens on property located within the City.

Section 5-81. Definitions.

- (a) Coop shall mean a structure with nesting boxes where hens can lay eggs and perches where hens can sleep, with a roof.
- (b) Enclosed pen shall mean a fenced or wire enclosure used to contain female hens.
- (c) Hen shall mean a female chicken of the species gallus domesticus.

Section 5-82. General requirements, improvements, and prohibitions.

- (a) The maximum number of hens permitted on any property shall be five (5).
- (b) All food for hens shall be stored in rodent and predator proof containers.
- (c) Hens shall not be permitted to trespass on neighboring properties, be released or set free and shall be kept within an enclosed pen according to the requirements of this Article at all times.
- (d) Hens shall not be kept on any property without a properly issued permit authorizing such use.

- (e) Coops and enclosed pens shall be kept clean and sanitary at all times so that they do not become a nuisance due to odor, noise, pests or other nuisance condition.
- (f) Hens shall be kept for personal use only. The selling of hens, eggs or manure, as well as breeding of chickens for commercial purposes is prohibited.
- (g) Hens shall not be slaughtered within the City.
- (h) Hens that are no longer wanted by their owners shall not be abandoned, released into the wild, or taken to the City's Animal Control.
- (i) If a public health emergency is declared by the Duval County Health Department related to hens, the permit holder shall comply with any requirements including, but not limited to, the removal of hens from the property.
- (j) Under no circumstances shall ducks, geese, turkeys, peafowl, pheasants, quail, peacocks, male chickens or any other poultry or fowl other than hens, be kept on any property.
- (k) The following improvements are required at the time of application and permit issuance and throughout the duration of an active permit to keep hens on a property:
 - (1) An enclosed pen that is:
 - a. At least ten (10) square feet per hen; and
 - b. Well drained so that there is no moisture accumulation.
 - (2) A coop that is:
 - a. At least three (3) square feet per hen;
 - b. Covered and ventilated to allow for a wholesome exchange of air; and
 - c. Attached to or within an enclosed pen that allows for free movement between the coop and enclosed pen.
 - (3) Coops and enclosed pens shall:
 - a. Not exceed six (6) feet in height;
 - b. Not exceed one hundred (100) square feet in total area;

- c. Be fully enclosed and secured from predators; and
 - d. Be anchored in a manner acceptable to the City to prevent them from becoming airborne during a wind event.
- (4) Opaque fencing or comparable landscaping that screens coops and enclosed pens from view by adjoining neighbors shall be installed.

Section 5-83. Permit required.

- (a) Any person seeking to keep a hen on their property must first obtain a permit from the City authorizing such use.
- (b) Prior to issuance of a permit authorizing hens on a property, an applicant shall submit to the City the following:
 - (1) A permit application containing the following information:
 - a. The name of the applicant;
 - b. The address of the property where hens are to be kept;
 - c. The maximum number of hens to be kept on the property at any given time;
 - d. The property owner's authorization if the applicant is not the property owner of record; and
 - e. An oath that no deed restrictions apply to the subject property or proof that deed restrictions, if any, do not prohibit the keeping of hens on the property.
 - (2) A Certificate of Completion demonstrating that the applicant has completed the Backyard Poultry Seminar offered by the Duval County Agricultural Extension Office; and
 - (3) Application fee of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars
- (c) Permits shall only be valid for the address provided.
- (d) Permits shall only be valid for the maximum number of hens approved.
- (e) As a condition of the issuance of the permit, the applicant and property owner (if different) shall consent to the inspection of the subject property by the City

upon receiving a complaint related to hens to ensure compliance with the requirements of this Article.

Section 5-84. Permitted zoning locations.

- (a) Hen(s) shall only be permitted on parcels developed with a single family dwelling located within the following zoning districts which have a minimum lot size of five thousand (5,000) square feet:
 - (1) RS-1, Residential, single-family
 - (2) RS-2, Residential, single-family
 - (3) RS-3, Residential, single-family
- (b) Under no circumstances shall hens be kept on property developed with multiple-family, two-family (duplex), or townhouse dwellings as defined in the City of Jacksonville Beach Land Development Code. Nor may any hens be kept on any non-residential property or development.
- (c) Coops and enclosed pens shall be located within the rear yard of a property only and shall be at least five (5) feet from side and rear property lines. No coop or enclosed pen shall be located in front or side yards.

Section 5-85. Effects on other parts of this Chapter.

- (a) Under no circumstances shall any dog, cat, or other authorized animal pursuant to this Chapter that maims or kills a hen, for that reason alone, be considered a dangerous animal.

Section 5-86. Enforcement.

- (a) Violations of this article shall be referred to the Special Magistrate of the City of Jacksonville Beach for disposition in accordance with F.S. § 162 and City Code Chapter 2, Article VI.
- (b) A finding by the Special Magistrate of illegal slaughter or neglect of hen(s) will result in revocation of the permit issued pursuant to this article.
- (c) Additionally, the City may take any other action or remedy authorized by law or in equity, including but not limited to, instituting an action in court to enjoin violations, in which case the violator and property owner shall be jointly and severally liable to the City for reimbursement of the City's attorneys' fees and accosts incurred in such action through any appellate action, if taken.
